Changes to the TFW Program

The Federal Government has announced changes to the Temporary Foreign Worker Program. As of December 13, 2016 an application in progress is no longer subject to cumulative duration, whether it is work with a permit or without a permit. However, some requirements of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations (IRPR) should be met, along with other eligibility criteria, such as the need for a Labour Market Impact Assessment (LMIA).

For applications where a final decision is reached before December 13, 2016 cumulative duration applies. Closed files will not be re-opened for reconsideration; however, an applicant previously refused solely on the basis of

paragraph R200(3)(g): ["has the foreign worker been employed in Canada for a cumulative period of four years...?"] may submit a new work permit application if all other requirements are met. The applicant may, necessarily, have to include the payment of any applicable fees.
